Presenters Possess Range of Experience

Catechesis, Fr. David Loftus understands, starts long before an individual meets a catechist. The teaching of the faith begins, he says, with God's initiative.

The former adult formation consultant in the Office of Religious Education for the Archdiocese of Los Angeles said that catechists should acknowledge God's action in relaying the faith. "God has been working and forming people long before they ever find themselves in the company of the Church's catechist," he said, adding, "Their pilgrimage, which brings them into the presence of the catechist, is already richly graced with life experiences and formative encounters that are part and parcel of their ongoing formation in the faith. Respect for this work of the Divine is an essential and integral aspect of the next stages of the journey for potential catechumens and candidates. It may require a renewed appreciation for the humility of the catechist and the initiation team of which they are a part."



Loftus will be among the team of presenters at the second annual National Gathering on Christian Initiation™ (NGCI) on July 5 and 6 at the Sheraton Grand Hotel in Chicago. The theme of the Gathering is "To Emmaus and Back: Liturgy and Catechesis."

Noting his "passion for formation," the pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Northridge, California, said that he is concerned about approaches to catechesis that are inadequate for "preparing and supporting people for a life of discipleship of Jesus Christ."

He considers the work of a catechist in initiation ministry to be "a sacred and responsible duty." Entering the pilgrimage of those seeking initiation, he said, requires skills and tools. "A well-disposed heart, a love of the faith, and a commitment to service are a good beginning. Well-formed catechists are a necessity, and a well-honed pastoral sense is increasingly important."



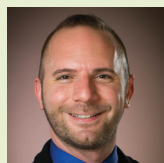
